

• Letter of Consent and Acceptance

- (1) A Letter of Consent and Acceptance must be printed on A4-sized paper for each of the co-authors or research collaborators mentioned in “2. Date and Name of Printed Publication” in the Thesis Table of Contents (hereinafter individually or collectively referred to as “co-authors”).
- (2) When asking your co-authors to produce a Letter of Consent and Acceptance, you must supply each of them with a copy of the “Requirement for Registration to the UTokyo Repository” (page 13), together with the Letter of Consent and Acceptance form.
- (3) If any co-author (including the estate of a deceased co-author) refuses to authorize web-based publication of the full thesis, you must file an Application for Publication of Thesis under Special Circumstances and submit an abridged version of the thesis in PDF format. Even in the case where the abridged thesis alone is going to be publicized, you are not exempt from submitting the full thesis in PDF as previously explained.
- (4) The date of the Letter of Consent and Acceptance is the day on which the co-author gives consent.
- (5) Each Letter of Consent and Acceptance must be signed by the respective co-author. If a co-author is a non-Japanese individual, please type his/her name in the designated space and ask him/her to sign the form.
- (6) You can submit the Letter of Consent and Acceptance if the sign of the co-author is scanned. If you submit the scanned documents, you or the co-author must retain the original documents for 10 years after the date of degree conferral.
- (7) A Letter of Consent and Acceptance is not required for a co-author (research collaborator) of a reference thesis.
- (8) A Letter of Consent and Acceptance is not required for a deceased co-author. However, if a Letter of Consent and Acceptance is issued by an estate of the deceased co-author, this consent is legally valid. In this case, please write their relationship with the deceased co-author below their signature. (e.g. son of the co-author, XXXXXX (co-author’s name))

*1) UTokyo Repository is a system to centrally control the digital resources of the various research findings created by members of the University of Tokyo that have been accumulated and stored for disclosure electronically through the internet in and outside the University. (<https://repository.dl.itc.u-tokyo.ac.jp/>)

*2) ProQuest Dissertations & Theses Global is one of the largest dissertation/theses database provided by ProQuest. It indexes dissertations and Master’s theses from around the world, especially North American graduate schools and European universities. The University of Tokyo has agreed with ProQuest to provide the full text and bibliographic information (such as title, author, etc.) of doctorate theses which are available online through the UTokyo Repository, based on the permissions of the author and co-authors. The data of theses registered in this database will also be searchable from other databases such as “Web of Science”.
